I. Lecture on Modern European Drama

The Department of English, RDWU organized a seminar on Modern European Drama on 4th Nov, 2019. Eminent scholar and academician from F.M. University graced the occasion as the chief speaker. The seminar began with the dignitaries lighting the lamp and paying floral tributes to Maa Rama Devi. The Head of the Department Prof. M.Pati gave the introductory speech which was followed by guest introduction by Smt. Alakananda Mishra. Thereafter Dr. Ray delivered a lecture on Modern European drama. Tracing the evolution of drama since the greek tragedies, she appraised the students of the genres move towards religious, secular, realistic and then more experimental plays of the twientieth century. She opined that the stage both influenced and was influenced by politics and social change. After a scholarly and insightful deliberation on the theatre of absurd, Dr. Ray focused on Ionesco's play Rhinocerous. She explained how through the symbol of the beast Ionesco gives the message everyman is capable enough to fight the beast that is both within and without. The talk was followed by an engaging question answer session. Then Sabahat Tabriz proposed the vote of thanks. The seminar was a grand success.

II. National Seminar on Women as Writers and Readers in Early Indian Novels

The Department of English organized a seminar "Woman as Writers and Readers in Early Indian Novel in the Wake of Basanti: Writing the New Women' was organised by the Department of English at Rama Devi Women's University here on Tuesday. It was a rare privilege on our part to have Dr Mini Krishnan as the Keynote Speaker. Dr Mini Krishnan is the Translation Editor of Oxford University Press. Dr Krishnan has contributed immensely to the cause of translation in India has also been a successful publisher of textbooks.





The Department of English in association with Oxford University Press organised the seminar. Vice-Chancellor of the university, Dr. Padmaja Mishra was the chief guest.

Senior faculty of English Department, Smt, Alakananda Mishra gave the vote of thanks. The event was anchored by Dr. Manisha Mishra.

Seminar on Sarala Mahabharat

The Department of English, Rama Devi women's university organized a one day seminar on Sarala Mahabharat on 13th Feb, 2020 in the Auditorium of the Academic Block 1. Eminent linguist B.N. Patnaik graced the occasion to shed light on the characters and episodes from Vyasa's Mahabharat while comparing and contrasting those with Sarala Das's Odia rendering of it. Dubbing Sarala Das' text, as a monumental work of art, Sri. Pattnaik opined that that not only our 'Adi Kabi' localized the characters, he also provided some of them immunity against the perpetual criticism they have faced. Sarala Mahabharat thus acquires greater psychological validity as the poet brings out the grey areas of the good as well as the evil characters. Drawing the students' attention to the female characters in general, Draupadi and Kunti in particular, Sri. Patnaik showed how innovation and creativity of a great storyteller has transformed the Sanskrit epic into a more relatable and earthy narrative. The technical session that followed the discussion was even more engaging with Sri. Patnaik's patient, scholarly and insightful answers to the queries. The seminar was supervised by Prof. Madhusmita Pati.
