I. Online Seminar on Speaking as Women

The Department of English, Ramadevi Women's University organised an online seminar on speaking as women on the occasion of former head of the department Smt. Alakananda Mishra's super-annuation. Prof. K. Srilatha from IIT Madras and Smt. Usha Akela from U.S.A. graced the seminar as chief guest and guest of honour. The online seminar began with Prof. Madhusmita Pati's introduction of the guests. Prof. K. Srilatha, a poet of great eminence, spoke on the necessity of a sincere voice of protest that can only come from a woman as she is the embodiment of the eternal feminine. Drawing on the personal experience as a scholar, academician, poet and a mother, Prof. Srilatha recounted how poetry could be both a tool and a target to fight social injustice. A poet of great repute Smt. Usha Akela then gave impassioned speech on poetry and antidote to human suffering in general. She emphasized the fact that the poet mirrors social anxieties and points an accusing finger towards the perpetrator at his own peril. But true poetry gives one the courage and strength to be on the side of the truth always. Both the speakers recited select pieces from their own collections. As the seminar was organised in honour of Smt. Alakananda Mishra, many members of the faculty fondly reminisced their association with Smt. Mishra. Smt. Mishra also spoke at length on her journey as a teacher and her stay at the erstwhile Ramadevi Women's (autonomous) college and the institutions evolution into the first women's university of eastern India. It was an emotionally charged the speech that made the participants reflect of life's deeper meanings. The meeting ended with a vote of thanks by Dr. Sabahat Tabriz.

II. Seminar on Romanticism in Literature



The Department of English, Ramadevi Women's University organized a seminar on Romanticism in Literature on 02.02.2022. Renowned Professor and Head of the Department of English of Utkal University, Prof. Asima Ranjan Parhi delivered his speech on Romanticism in literature. Romanticism is a literary movement spanning roughly between 1790-1850. Prof. Parhi discussion that the movement was characterized by a celebration of nature and common man, a focus on individual experience, an idealization of women and an embrace of isolation and melancholy. Prof. Parhi spoke that the Romantic Movement emphasized emotions over reasons; feelings and intuitions were more prevalent than intellectual ideas or thoughts. Emotions play an important role than reasons. Feelings and intuitions were given more priority than ideas or thoughts. Emotions, even passions and sexual attractions were addressed in literature during the Romantic Period.

After the floral tribute to Maa Ramadevi by the dignitaries, Smt. Alakananda Mishra introduced the speaker to the audience commenting on the impacts of Romanticism in Literature. Prof. Parhi discussed the causes and impacts of Romanticism in Literature. He also discussed what role Romanticism plays in Literature. Prof. Asima Ranjan Parhi cleared all the doubts of the students. He also explained to students how to interpret the text in light of recent literary theories. The lecture finished with a vote of thanks by Smt. Alakananda Mishra.

III. Seminar on Chandrasekhar Rath's Astride the Wheel



The Department of English, Ramadevi Women's University organised a talk on the novel Astride the Wheel on 04.03.2022. Renowned scholar, translator and publisher Jatin Kumar Nayak who has translated the novel written by Prof. Chandrasekhar Rath from original Odia, delivered an in depth analysis of the text. Dubbing it as one of the greatest novels, dealing with Odia life and Jagannath Sanskriti Prof. Nayak discussed the two pilgrimages – one outward and the other inward – in Sanatan Dasa's life. Citing examples from Ratha Saptaka, Prof. Nayak showed the author's innate understanding and appreciation for a life of piety and devotion. After the floral tribute to Maa Ramadevi by the dignitaries, Smt. Alakananda Mishra introduced the speaker to the audience commenting on Sri Rath's language; Prof. Nayak said the novel's greatness lies in its intimacy with the Odia soil, its people and their lives. The second part of the talk focused on the problems of translation. Culture specificity of the text problematizes the translation of all texts, more so when one chooses a text like Yantrarudha. The discussion resumed post after the lunch break where Prof. Nayak not only cleared the doubts of the students, he also explained to students how to interpret the text in light of recent literary theories. The lecture ended with a vote of thanks by Smt. Alakananda Mishra.
