I. "The power and pleasure of Reading" by Dr. Chandrahas Choudhury (31.03.2023)



On March 31, 2023, **The Department of English** at Ramadevi Women's University organized a seminar on "**The Pleasure and Power of Reading.**" Mr. Chandrahas Choudhry, a prominent writer, journalist, creative writing teacher, and literary critic, gave a speech at the seminar about the importance of reading in today's day and age and the importance of personal ambition in advancing literature. Dr. Manisha Mishra, HOD, Department of English, spoke at the event and shared her thoughts on how reading has shifted over the years and how we no longer travel with books as companion. However, social media has a greater impact on our lives, and this is one of the more frequent adverse effects of the same. Dr. Madhusmita Pati greeted Chandrahas Sir and felicitated him with a few words in his praise. Mr. Chandi Charan Rath, CPGC, Sir, welcomed everyone and spoke a few words to motivate the students. He talked about how being organized and acquiring knowledge through intensive reading are crucial in the modern age. Furthermore, to help us understand, he described a conversion between the brain and the heart. The brain deals with logic, whereas the heart forms relationships spontaneously and with

consideration and feelings. Building relationships from the heart and reading for pleasure can transform a person into a true intellectual. Mr. Chandrahas Choudhury, kindly asked the students whether they pursued literature by chance or by choice. Many interesting questions were raised by enthusiastic graduate and postgraduate students during the interactive session, which he addressed with utmost clarity and made the discussion instructive and stimulating.

Mr. Himanshu S. Patra, Ex HOD Department of English, Utkal University, and Retired Professor, introduced everyone to his translated work "Following my heart," followed by a short discussion about its summary and the way the Koraput conference influenced today's seminar. Dr. Itishri Sarangi offered the vote of thanks to the present dignitaries and thanked the students in particular for their efforts.

II. Seminar On Travel and Women



8. Events And Out-Reach Programmes Conducted:






9. Events at the Department of English:

I. Sketch the Author Competition held in the department on 18.04.2023. Twenty students participated in the event and prizes were accordingly given.








Sketch the Author Competition



As part of the activity of LITERARY IMPRESSIONS its first discussion on the book, "THE PICTURE OF DORIAN GRAY" by Oscar Wilde via Google meet. A youthful aesthete in late 19th-century England was the subject of a devastating depiction by Oscar Wilde in this well-known work. The book's remarkable premise—which combines aspects of the Gothic horror tale with decadent French fiction—is as follows: His body continues to be perfectly young and vibrant as Dorian Gray descends into a life of crime and excessive pleasure, but his recently painted portrait transforms into a horrific record of evil that he must keep hidden from the public. This captivating tale of terror and suspense has been immensely popular for more than a century.

The meeting started with CPGC sir Prof. Chandi Charan Rath **sharing** a few words of motivation and by wishing the students all the best for the presentation. The meeting then proceeded in the presence of Dr. Manisha Mishra, HOD Department of English and Ms. Silpa Khan faculty in-charge of the book club. The theme of the month was "Literature and Morality."

The speaker of the meeting Pratistha Panda UG 2nd year started the discussion by providing a brief summary of the book and discussing its various themes like aestheticism, social background of Victorian era, she also says "An artist pours their

love in their art" Oscar Wilde's other major works and the importance of this work in contemporary society. Different questions on the book were raised for the discussion by many students. An active participation was seen from Amrita Mishra UG 1st year by saying "Experience doesn't come with age, it comes with trauma". Anwesha Nayak, UG 2nd year pointed out the female protagonist's uncanny similarities with the Shakespearean character Juliet and the male protagonists absences of similarities with Romeo and how this 'damsel in distress' portrayal negatively affects the identity and the social image of woman, Swagatika Rath, UG 2nd year raised the question about aging being the prominent theme in the novel, Pratikshya Mohanty UG 2nd year remarked an excellent quote from the book "Experience is a name man has given to their mistakes" and Digdarshini Panda, PG 1st year raised the question about the reflection, correlation and relevance of the novel in the Victorian era and in the current society.

There was an enormous response and enthusiasm shown by the students of the university. Students of different departments showed their interest and participated in the discussion. There were 40 participants across the departments. There were some highly anticipated questions such as being Oscar Wilde's only novel, can the picture of Dorian Gray be considered as his autobiography, experience and old age are important factors for a person's intellectual morality establishment, as Dorian was not aging physically can it be considered as a reason for his ill behaviour? Various opinionated quotes were put forward by the students which led to an engaging discussion amongst the students. Prejudices and women were another briefly discussed topic of the day. It is an achievement and a matter of extreme delight for the Department of English to see the surge of positive response from the students through the participation. The repetitive show of the spirit of reading in the young hearts, the enthusiasm to learn more and discover new literary aspects of life is a proud moment for the English Department. The hope to make new changes and shape the young minds for the better by rousing love for the literature and life remains our foremost objective.
