The two days National level seminar will be the first of its kind to be organized in Odisha on the theme 'Gender, Environment and Sustainable Development.'. The 2030 Agenda and the associated Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) set the foundation for comprehensive and integrated action on gender equality. However, development approach is still overseeing some complex social, digital and communication and representation dimensions without adequate acknowledging gender concerns. In the transition towards the goal of sustainability, women and men have emerged as forces, not only in support of proper environmental management, but also demands for better quality of life and greater social equity. Increasing knowledge about the ways in which women in different groups and sectors of society participate in development has highlighted the interconnection between gender, the environment and sustainability.

Development that rides on the back of depletion of natural resources is unsustainable and measures must be taken to use, manage and protect environment in a sustainable manner. With the focus of these goals, achieving gender equity is critical to sustainable development. However, a sustainable development pathway must be established which has an explicit commitment to gender equality and seeks to enhance women's capabilities, respect and protect their rights. Women must have full and equal participation in decision making and policy development to create this pathway.

Multidimensional approaches help us to track the gender equality in the white areas and gray areas. The recognition of the rights of Mother Earth and the entitlements of both men and women is vital for stopping the exploitation of natural resources, biodiversity degradation and putting them at the centre of new paradigms of knowledge, economy and power. For sustainable development to become a reality, it is inevitable on policymakers to envision growth strategies that recognize and respond to the gender-based realities in the sphere of managing the environment and natural resources.

Objectives

1. To understand the link between eco-feminist perspectives of environment and sustainable development.

- 2. To gather multidimensional perspectives of environmental challenges from diverse stakeholders towards achieving gender rights and sustainable development goals.
- 3. To present the gender dynamics around environmental management and disaster risk reduction.
- 4. To integrate gender equality and justice in the environmental policies and project interventions.

Participants

The Seminar aims to bring together scholars, academicians, practitioners, corporate leaders, policy makers and civil society on a single platform having interest in the seminar topic and any of its subthemes in India. Scholars will contribute their insight into areas of their interest, present their thoughts, share experience, and research findings. We believe that the seminar will co-create knowledge on the existing trends of equal representation of both women and men in decision-making at environmentally friendly development transformation.

- d) Entrepreneurial skills for "green entrepreneurs".

- b) Leadership and involvement in decision-making process
- c) Integrating gender analyses into policy making and strategies
- d) Role of National and State agencies in environmental management

Consumerism destroying environment'

Bhubaneswar: A seminar on Gender Environment and Sustainable Development was organised by PG Department of Gender Studies at Rama Devi Women University here, Saturday. On the occasion, Padma Shree Radha Mohan said, "Women are yet to be given the status they deserve in the male dominated society. In many places women are barred from asking questions or seeking equal rights. We can't think of ourselves as developed nation in any way unless and until we change the situation." Padma Shree Sabarmatee said, "Consumerism is the big reason behind environmental disturbance. We are damaging the natural resources and environment more and more for our needs. This is total violation of sustainable development principle which defines it as "Meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs...(sic)".

 - 4. Objective of the Event: Menstruation has gained global attention in recent years as a critical and under-addressed issue. On any given day, hundreds of millions of girls and women around the world are menstruating, yet a substantial proportion of them lack the knowledge and the means to manage their menstrual health safely and with dignity. This stems from gender inequality, cultural taboos, poverty, and a lack of basic sanitation and hygiene. Culture, awareness, and socioeconomic status often exert profound influence on menstrual practices. However, health education programs for young women in developing countries do not often address menstrual hygiene, practices, and their social and psychological impact. Developing culturally sensitive menstrual health education and hygiene programs for adolescent females has been recommended by professional health organizations like the World Health Organization and UNICEF. A concerted effort should be made from an inter-multi-transdisciplinary perspective to bridge the gap between research, perception, and practice of Menstrual Health.
